

To the Hon. HUGH GUTHRIE, K.C., P.C.,  
Minister of Justice.

HONOURABLE SIR,—I have the honour to submit reports and statistics regarding the administration of penitentiaries for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1932.

The number of convicts in custody at the close of the fiscal year was 4,164 as compared with 3,714 at the beginning of the year. The average daily population was 3,931, an average increase per diem of 49 per cent.

The following tables show the movement of population at the several penitentiaries:—

The per capita cost per convict per day for the fiscal year 1931-32 was \$1.38.

The casual revenue returned to the Receiver General of Canada amounted to \$175,491.66.

Revenue, casual revenue and refund of expenditure amounted to \$179,754.28.

Eight hundred and thirty-seven convicts were released by expiration of sentence; 379 paroled, 83 deported, 19 pardoned, and 16 died.

Eight convicts violated the conditions of their parole and were returned to penitentiaries.

Of the convicts confined in penitentiaries on March 31, 1932, 2,806 were born in Canada; 1,358 were born in other countries; 181 were serving life sentences; 527 were under 20 years of age; 1,908 were over 20 and under 30 years of age; 272 were over 50 years of age.

Owing to the rapid increase in population, the cell accommodation was overtaxed in Kingston, St. Vincent de Paul, Dorchester, Manitoba, and Saskatchewan penitentiaries, and it has been necessary to accommodate convicts in dormitories or cell block corridors.

The total number of cells in penitentiaries is 3,794, which includes hospital and isolation cells. During the year extra cell construction was commenced and on the 31st of March, 1932, there were 665 new cells under construction.

*Kingston Penitentiary.*—The principal construction work at this penitentiary was on the new prison for women. The stone work on the Administration Building has been completed and the concrete floors poured. This building contains 100 cells, which should be ready for occupation in October, 1932. The boundary wall of this prison is 90 per cent completed.

The reconstruction of the west shop block which was formerly the asylum building is progressing favourably and will supply added shop space which is much needed in this penitentiary.

Mail bag, shoemaking, and tailoring departments produced a revenue of \$59,700 during the fiscal year.

*St. Vincent de Paul.*—The outstanding construction work in this penitentiary was the excavation for temporary cell block No. 2, the new south wing extension, new Roman Catholic chapel and kitchen wing. Temporary cell block No. 2 should be ready for occupation early in August of 1932 and will have accommodation for 204 convicts.

Necessary alterations were made in the boiler house and machine shop, improving the storage space and supervision.

One hundred and fifty feet of concrete duct was constructed from the river to the pump house, and contains the intake pipe for the water supply.

Very satisfactory progress has been made on the new group of buildings. A culvert 700 feet long was commenced; 365 feet had been completed on March 31, 1932. Ducts for the new group of buildings were excavated. Good progress

was made towards completion. The main duct will connect this group of buildings with the old group. Eventually one central power plant will supply both groups of buildings.

*Dorchester*.—Construction was continued on the new boiler room, workshops, and Roman Catholic chapel, the first floor of the power house building being completed.

The masons' department manufactured 173,000 concrete bricks to be used in the buildings in connection with the penitentiary.

The water supply at this penitentiary is not satisfactory, but experiments will be carried out on a source recently made available.

*Manitoba*.—The construction of the new Protestant chapel and the new kitchen was completed; also two stone residences with a double garage for use of farm instructors.

The new west wing foundations were poured and stone laid to the height of 35 feet. This was covered over with a temporary roof just before freeze-up so that the work of constructing cells could be continued throughout the winter months.

Excavation for the foundations for the Roman Catholic chapel, new schoolroom, and for the new Administration Building are being continued.

The shops of this penitentiary, among other things, manufactured 1,760 feet of 18-inch drainage tile and repaired 43,537 mail bags.

*Saskatchewan*.—The brickwork on the new west wing cell block was commenced in April and completed before November 1, 1931. The cells were poured and a temporary roof put on, making it possible to provide a satisfactory amount of inside work during the winter months, which consisted of plastering walls and placing cell barriers.

The brickwork on the chapel and kitchen extension was completed up to the chapel floor and the erection of the steelwork completed.

The outside walls and fireproof cement roof of the new shops were completed. The interiors of these shops were finished with white-faced cement brick of fine quality manufactured in the penitentiary.

A much-needed coal vault was built and the construction of a new chimney was started.

One thousand seven hundred feet of storm sewer pipe was laid.

During the fiscal year the masons' department manufactured 867,000 cement bricks, 1,211 feet of sewer tile, and 238 cement fence posts.

The farm had a very successful year from the point of view of production, but has not made as good a financial showing as in other years, due to the prevailing low price of farm commodities. Over 13,000 bushels of grain were grown. The hay crop was 357 loads. The field crop was above average.

*British Columbia*.—A new boiler house with 120-foot cement smoke stack was completed.

A rearrangement and remodelling of the older portions of the penitentiary permitted an increase in the size of the schoolroom.

The ground in the vicinity of Columbia street was graded and terraced to conform with the landscape and architectural scheme.

*Collin's Bay*.—Satisfactory progress has been made in the construction of this new penitentiary.

Foundations of the new Administration Building, erection and riveting of steel, main duct construction and the completion of the permanent pumphouse were carried out.

Temporary shops were built and necessary machinery installed.

Approximately 500 acres of the farm land were cleared of brush and stone and ploughed ready for 1932 crop. A very satisfactory cow-shed has been erected, also cement and brick creamery and cooling room.

A temporary piggery was brought into use, which contains feed, boiler-room and slaughter-house.

The carpenter, blacksmith, and machine shops were able to carry out the greater portion of the work for this penitentiary.
