## GENERAL ASSESSMENT

This Annual Report relates to the investigation of federal offences under Part IV.1 of the Criminal Code, the majority of which are related to drugs.

During 1984, the RCMP continued to focus extensive investigative effort on importation and trafficking in illicit drugs. The use of electronic surveillance continues to be an essential aid to gather evidence against organized criminal groups. The following examples of investigations illustrate both the complexity of investigations of sophisticated and well organized criminal groups, and how electronic surveillance contributed to the arrest and conviction of individuals involved in this type of criminal activity.

### EXAMPLE NO. 1

A Drug Section of the RCMP in a major Canadian city utilized electronic surveillance to successfully conclude an investigation of a major drug trafficking conspiracy. The suspects were believed to have connections with organized crime figures in a second major city. When no progress was made using conventional investigative procedures, authorization to intercept private communications were obtained under Part IV.1 of the C.C. in two provinces. With renewals, the authorizations were used over a six month period during which twelve technical intercepts were employed. The investigation resulted in the arrest of three persons and the laying of some 22 drug related charges. An additional 32 Criminal Code charges have also been laid by local police forces against these individuals. Seizures included; 66 kilograms of hashish (street value of \$935,000.00), six kilograms of methamphetamine i.e. "speed" (street value of \$850,000.00), \$15,000.00 in cash, a number of restricted weapons, housebreaking tools, and materials used in armed robberies. The breaking up of the organization has created discord between the criminal communities of the two cities because most of the seized drugs had been "fronted" by a criminal organization in the second city. The investigation also resulted in the capture of a person wanted by three municipal police forces.

EXAMPLE NO. 2

An intensive investigation was conducted by another RCMP Drug Section into a large and well organized methamphetamine, i.e. "speed", manufacturing and trafficking operation. In order to gather the evidence necessary to launch criminal proceedings against the leaders of the organization (who kept themselves detached from the actual manufacturing and trafficking activities); it was necessary to employ the interception of private communications. Authorizations under Part IV.1 C.C. were obtained and were in effect over a seven month period. The investigation revealed that chemicals obtained in Europe were used to manufacture methamphetamine at two clandestine laboratories. These laboratories were subsequently raided and closed down. Seven and a half kilograms of methamphetamine were seized. A total of eleven persons were charged with "trafficking" and "conspiracy to traffic" in connection with methamphetamine. Sentences handed down to date range from four to eight years. It should also be noted that one member of the organization under investigation was found murdered. This offence is currently under investigation by a provincial police force.

EXAMPLE NO. 3

A drug trafficking investigation in a third location in Canada which later expanded to southwestern Ontario, Alberta, and the State of New York, U.S.A., resulted in the arrest of seven persons in Canada and three in the United States. The accused were well organized, very surveillance conscious, and it was difficult to gather evidence using conventional investigational techniques. As a result, authorizations to intercept private communications were obtained under Part IV.1 and utilized over an eight month period. A total of 28 technical intercepts were made. It was found that the accused were manufacturing methamphetamine, i.e. "speed", in a clandestine laboratory using chemicals obtained from contacts in a local University. Seizure of cocaine with a street value of \$40,000.00 and a number of prohibited and restricted weapons was made. A total of thirteen Food & Drugs Act and Narcotic Control Act charges have been laid. An additional nine Criminal Code charges in the United States have been laid. Court action is not yet concluded on these matters.
